SENATOR CHAMBERS: This bill will take effect ninety days after the Legislature adjourns.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Now, if the Legislature doesn't pass this bill, it would, I assume, be reintroduced next time and it wouldn't apply until ninety days after the next session which would be sometime in the summer of 1975. Is that correct?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Probably so.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Now, when do you intend to take the bar examination?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I may never take it.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Well, if you graduate which I expect you will....without this debate....but when do you intend to take the bar examination?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It's really difficult for me to tell.

SENATOR FELLMAN: When do you expect to graduate from law school?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It's difficult to say.

SENATOR FELLMAN: When are you scheduled to graduate from law school?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There is no schedule for it at this point.

SENATOR FELLMAN: When are you....when does the Dean think you're going to graduate?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I haven't discussed it with him.

SENATOR FELLMAN: What about LB932 and LB933 that affect the petition candidacy that you are involved with on the governor and lieutenant governor's race and what would be the effect according to those who are proposing those two bills if they are not passed?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You would have to ask them.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Isn't it your position that if those two bills are not passed, you have a pretty good law suit in Federal Court?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: My position is that if they are passed, since they impose affirmative requirements on one candidate that are not imposed on the other, there'll be a better law suit. Now, I've talked to the Attorney General about it and he stated that the only state in the Union where this same condition would obtain, it could be successfully a challenge but the Attorney General will not challenge it because he wants to run for governor himself. That's with these bills.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Mr. Meyers wants to run for Governor?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, in the state where they have a similar situation.

SENATOR FELLMAN: No, let's get back to my original question. Isn't it your position that you have a good law suit as the
