Now I agree with Senator Luedtke that the bills that were set for a day certain are entitled to be heard. We are not really doing that any more. The Legislature has been turning that down, but bills before that were set for a day certain that we didn't get to in my judgement is only fair that we put those ahead of the underlined bills. I presume Senator Richendifer you have no objection to that, or do you? All right, Senator Richendifer is willing to include that in his motion. So that it will be clear. I see nothing wrong with it.

PRESIDENT: That will help. Now, Senator Richendifer.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: I just wanted to point out, Mr. President. that I don't have a bill underlined. I underlined somebody else's bill. It makes no difference to me.

PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR GOODRICH: Do we still have the motion before us?

PRESIDENT: We do. We have Senator Richendifer's motion before which is to print the underlined bills after the bills that are already set for a time certain after the A Bills. In other words the A Bills, be first. Then the bills for a time certain. Then the underlined bills. And all this is, is just that they would be listed in that order.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Well, I was just going to propose an alternate solution, which I've got a motion laying on the desk which I figured would take up the ACD Bill this afternoon immediately, and then go on with that with the underlined bills, get as many of them out of the way as possible today, and then go over and start Monday with the appropriations bills.

PRESIDENT: Let's work on this motion we have here now. Let's not confuse things, anymore. Apparently we can't accomplish even that. Senator Carpenter do you want to be heard on the Richendifer motion?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, the only position that I had. Is that in no case should this body discontinue now a consideration of all the appropriation bills. After that then put them in order in that order that you can get the body to agree to. I would hope that nobody for any reason would now get off the consideration of the appropriation bills until we go through them. And dispose of them.

PRESIDENT: Except for what the action was this morning. Which suspended the rules and takes up 834 and 977.

SENATOR CARPENTER: They suspended the rules on that.

PRESIDENT: That's still the order here now. Now, Speaker Proud.
