get a carpenter and wait a year and a half for a carpenter. And you want an electrician and you wait three or four months. There's really no great incentive to do anything. Just sit on your fanny and do nothing. Is really the smartest thing to do.

PRESIDENT: Next to speak is Senator Barnett. Discussing the Goodrich amendment. Let's try to...

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 SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President that's what I intend to do. I wonder if Senator Goodrich would yield to a question, because I think this amendment may sound all right, but I'm a little bit leery of it. Senator Goodrich, not because it's you, but because the thing I'm interested in is that if we start and this is the question in a round about way. You will have...the question is this, if you put in a cost of living, and you start it with a mother and one child at \$175. With that cost of living is a 5 or a 6% increase over the year, you are going to give her about \$8, next year aren't you.

SENATOR GOODRICH: No., 8% increase are you talking about?

SENATOR BARNETT: No, 5% what is it this year.

SENATOR GOODRICH: It's 8.8 this year. The last calendar year let's put it that way.

SENATOR BARNETT: About 10 or 12 dollars.

SENATOR GOODRICH: You would give her about 12 dollars.

SENATOR BARNETT: O.K. What would give the mother that had three or four children under the same circumstances in this bill?

SENATOR GOODRICH: The mother and three children, ball park figures I'm talking, the mother and three children in this bill would get \$300. It would be, she would get \$375 plus \$70 would bring her up approximately to \$390. No, including \$300. No, I'm sorry. Let's back that off. A mother and three children would get \$245 and you would just apply the 8.8 or whatever the index is, whatever the index says. You apply that to that figure, and if that turns out, for example 5% would give her about

SENATOR BARNETT: \$15

SENATOR GOODRICH: Something close to that, yes.

SENATOR BARNETT: What I'm saying is, I think Senator Goodrich that your intentions may be honorable. But I think what you are doing is locking in an equity here. The simple reason that you have a small amount for ADC, when you hook this into it, the cost of living increase, there's a possibility that we may not give these people what they actually need to exist. And I think that what we should do is. I have to agree with some of these other people that maybe when these set figures would get high enough that a mother and child could get along, then it might be all right. But at the present time with it as low as it is, I can't see how you would be helping them a
