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record for his constituency that he is opposed to ADC. He's opposed to children receiving the amount of money it would take to live at a half way decent level because this is not 100% funding of the standard of needs. So, I ask you to use Senator Goodrich's amendments and the context of a man seeking re-election who has always been opposed to any increases in ADC and let us keep the bill in an understandable form

which is the way it is in the book. Again I ask you to reject this amendment and any other amendment offered to this bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: I rise to oppose the amendments which was proposed by Senator Goodrich, and I would like to give him the opportunity to withdraw this amendment, if he would choose to do so at this time.

PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich, do you care to respond.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Can I respectfully decline the invitation.

PRESIDENT: I bet you can. All right Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President and fellow members. I'm not against ADC payments. But, for the simple reason that I'd like to help these children, now for example, if a World Herald or a Lincoln Journal wants carrier boys. Where do they go to get them? They go to the folks who don't need the money. They're the ones that carry the papers. It's very difficult, now there are many exceptions to this, but you go to the poorer section of town and and try to get someone to carry the newspapers, it's very difficult. For a good reason. So the reason that I probably would go along with the Goodrich amendment, is probably because I love these children and I want them to not to spoil them. If they are big enough to carry a paper or 10 or 12 years old, I think they should be doing it if they want to do it. As it is there's an incentive not to do it. And in my town, the doctors two sons carry the papers. He's probably one of the most..best off financially than anyone in town, but his two sons carry the papers. But you go to the poor part of town, and there is no one that wants to carry papers there.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh, then Senator Whitney. Discussing the Goodrich second amendment.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. My good friend, Senator Goodrich, has done it again. He has topped himself this time by, in all this discussion that we've gone through in committee, and since this bill was introduced. He's had several different tracks to take here. The last
