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says a mother and three children need \$307. But we are giving her \$340, if she took complete advantage of 100% advantage of the food stamp program. Now over and above that, they also get day care service, legal service, home-makers service, family planning service, employment service, protective services, transportation services, and a myriad of other services. However, it's comparing \$340 to the \$307 that the Department of Welfare says she needs. Now I personally think that's still a little low, and the..in the 71 years the federal government came in and made us raise the standard of needs figures, and they are probably going to do it very shortly again, anyhow. However, over and above the \$340 that she would be getting, she would also get \$68 worth of medical payments. This figures out to be \$17 per person, per month. Is what the Department of Welfare paid as an average last year for ADC's people medical payments. So since there is 4 people, a mother and three children, you multiply 4 times \$17 or \$68 permonth, as she is getting as net benefit of \$408 per month, plus all these day care legal services, homemaker services, etc. Now, let me caution you of one thing though. As I said, all ADC mothers do not participate to the full extent of food stamps. If you take the actual average ~~that~~ they participate in, it's about \$54.64 is the actual average per month per family per food stamps. So you take your \$235, add \$55, round it out to \$55 for mathematical purposes, you get \$290 plus the \$68, is \$358, is about what the benefits she gets, plus these other day care services and that sort of thing.

PRESIDENT: Are you all through Senator Whitney? All right, Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Well, Mr. President, and members of the Legislature. I think we all know what we're going to do. I oppose the Goodrich amendments for the reasons given by Senator Cavanaugh, and I think that none of us are in the mood at this time to branch on this bill or any other bill. I think the bill we have here is as near to being a definite price tag bill as we can come up with, and I think we ought to just stick with the bill.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter, your light is on do you want to be heard on this Second Goodrich amendment here?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, as I understand it, the difference is between the Schmit bill and what's reported as being the Governor's bill. Senator Kennedy is your bill 977, the Governor's desires?

PRESIDENT: Senator Kennedy.

SENATOR KENNEDY: Well, let me..and maybe we just as well discuss it up to that point.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, give me a yes or no.

PRESIDENT: Well, wait a minute gentlemen. Senator Carpenter we are discussing.. Really the only issue before the body, and I want to call your attention to this, is the second Goodrich amendment. That's really the only issue before us at this time, and I know that it's going to be difficult to confine yourself
