PRESIDENT: Now, Senator Schmit do you care to close now on 834. Senator Schmit is now closing.

SENATOR SCHMIT: I have no closing, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: And the question is, do you want to advance LB834 from General File to E & R Initial. All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Voting on the movement of 834 from General File to E & R Initial. And the Chair is going to inquire if you have all voted. Once again have you all voted? Clerk will record. Read the total.

CLERK: 34 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: LB834 is advanced. That brings up for General File discussion LB977. Senator Schmit for what purpose do you rise?

CLERK: That brings us to 834A, Mr. President.

SENATOR SCHMIT: 834A must follow and I would move, Mr. President, I think this is the landmark we have never had a no vote on that bill.

PRESIDENT: Do we need to read 834A.

CLERK: 834A (read)

PRESIDENT: Do you need to debate 834A. SENator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: There are no amendments. Mr. President I move that the bill be advanced to E & R. I'm sorry about the money figures, but I think that we have a figure here that is established, and I don't happen to think, unless Senator Marsh has better figures, more recent that she is recommending. I move that the bill be advanced.

PRESIDENT: SENator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I just want to ask Senator Schmit a question. As I understand it, in this bill there is no county money involved. Is that so, or not?

SENATOR SCHMIT: This is state, Mr..Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: No county money at all.

SENATOR SCHMIT: No county money that I know of.

PRESIDENT: The question is shall LB 834A be advanced from General File to E & R Initial. All those in favor vote aye, all those opposed vote no. Voting on the advancement of 834A. Have you all voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 36 ayes, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The bill is advanced.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Richendifer asked to be excused for the balance of the day.

PRESIDENT: Are there objections to his absence. You are in trouble Senator.
