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with each other if we are going to get anything. And that's the way it ought to be. We ought to admit it. All I'm saying Let's us take back our original responsibility to the extent we believe the need is there, let's authorize it. Let the rates come afterwards in which then, that's the only time we can make a determinations what it's going to be. Now the Chief Executive apparently is concerned about raising the Sales Tax a quarter of a half of one percent. Now to me, that's cutting it awfully thin. And the Income tax a like amount. Now whether or not we should reduce the Income Tax is a new questions now. We cannot reverse ourselves, and have no factual basis upon the consideration of any of these bills. We in the first time ought to exercise our own judgement. We've got two places to go. We've got the Budget Committee, which is not perfect, even they admit that. We know we are not. But if there is one thing we do know, collectively we have as much intelligence. We have as much of a capability to determine need with our staff as the Governor has with his staff. And the Constitution gives us the right to accept that responsibility, and it gives him a way in order to cut it out if he so desires, and it gives a way also to override him, it we want to. Let's take one step at a time. If you think the need is there, let's be men and women enough to vote it. He disagrees, let him reduce it. When it gets on Final Reading, then we will make the final decision, what does this body want to do, and what do we want to stand up and be counted for. It's just that simple. This budget is the beginning, not the end. The beginning of the earmarking in a broad sense, in order to bring back to this body that which is basically ours. With the hope that we will never give to anybody else. And they say it's like the President of the United States. He over a period of time gave all his powers away for all practical purposes. He even impounded all the funds. He did everything that was necessary in order to do what he wanted to do. And the Congress really advocated their responsibilities. We have to a lesser extent, and I propose that if I can help. Let's take it back.

PRESIDENT: The Senators who have asked to speak now. I'm going to permit Senator Marvel anytime he believes he's been asked a question to answer the question, but the speaking order is now Senators DeCamp, Nore, Frank Lewis, Clark. Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature. When I pushed the button we were talking about the Norfolk Regional Center, and I merely had a question for Senator Kennedy or Senator Marvel on that. Would that be appropriate at this time.

PRESIDENT: Yes.

SENATOR DECAMP: Senator Marvel, you and Senator Kennedy were discussing the Regional Center and Senator Kennedy of course stated his concern with it, as you know for at least three years here I've watched very closely, and I have the impression at least, that it's slowly being closed down. Now I realize that this is a difficult thing to answer, but if you were projecting this two or three years in the future, do you see that there will be any inpatient treatment center there, or do you have any ideas on this.
