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we never will have one. Now I would hope that the Chairman of the committee would put it in this budget so we will know what we got. And not do it over again, because as I recall, and if I'm wrong the Chairman can quit, we spent some two hundred thousand dollars in order to have the plan.

SENATOR STAHMER: If I can respond, the plan you have deals specifically at the felon level and made no attempt to go across the state and work in a correctional plan especially dealing with facilities down to the County and our regional level that included misdemeanants all the way up. What you have is the statewide plan dealing primarily with felons and I get this when the man over at LEAA. I'm not the expert, I think he is. He was the man that worked in the prison as the assistant in charge of work release. He tells me other states are developing master plans. We do not now have a master plan. And what you have is not a master plan. It is a plan that dealt with one level of corrections, not the entire level of corrections. And if I'm wrong, I'd like to have him come here and tell me I'm wrong, because this is the word I get from him. He's in LEAA.

SENATOR CARPENTER: The place for him to go is Chairman of the Judiciary Committee and not to you and nine other places. If we don't have what he wants, he ought to tell us. He ought to give us more money to do it. We thought we were meeting the requirements of everybody, now we're not going down into the area of a fairy tale bill, to go from the time the child is born and try to predetermine what he is going to be. We can't do that because there is not enough money in the world to do that. And somebody always want to clear out in left field, to do something that he knows nobody can do. This is a start. And that's all you are ever going to get.

SENATOR STAHMER: If I might respond, I think it is a very inappropriate start because you are starting something other states haven't done. Other states have developed a true master plan. They are doing what your people over in LEAA want done. And we have federal money to do it. And other states are doing it, and Uncle Sam wants you to do it. And this just isn't Dave Stahmer's idea. This comes from the out of Washington. It comes out of the official source of all the planning in the University of Illinois. This is what other states are doing. And we don't have it. Pure and simple, Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: What do we care what other states are doing. We've got a Judiciary Committee that we have given the authority as a standing committee. Been working for years. Now if you don't like what we did, why don't you just disband us. And I'm not saying what other...we don't care what other states are doing. The report indicated that. We've done more this..Chairman..that committee has done more in the area of penal reform than all the other committees since the history of this state. And you stand up there and criticize us, because someone other he objects. Some other state has done this, just like 1028. They compared to Illinois because, Illinois has made all the exceptions. In Illinois, they didn't say, you buy what you get in Illinois. We haven't got that far yet.

SENATOR STAHMER: Senator Carpenter, I for one care about people, and my record will demonstrate I do. And I care about children and I care about youth, and I care about misdemeanants. I care
