that we should. I would not...I think that Senator Luedtke's research and the plan developed by Senator Luedtke's committee has certain defects. I wouldn't go so far as Senator Fellman to say that it was 99% correct. I think they did very little work in Douglas County. I don't think that they considered the penal composition of Douglas County, or the needs of Douglas County, and I think that that needs to be done, and that Douglas County needs to be integrated into the state plan, which I don't feel that they were under the former plan that was conducted. But I...if we are limiting ourselves here as to whether or not need to do further study on the state plan, I think that we do and that is about all I can say on it. I think that this does not relate to where the medium-minimum security prison should be constructed, if we are going to construct one this year, and I think we ought to make that clear.

PRESIDENT: Senator, the Chair wants to remind you that we are talking about capital construction now, and I'm not sure at all that we're on the part that Senator Marvel covered. So I ask you to not talk about things that are not germane to the subject, and if you do not I will just have to cut you off because we're...we will get to these other things. Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature. I feel maybe that what we really need here is an amendment which will create more programs, similar to what they had in Des Moines. Where we visited the correctional program there. They had about 50 men who had been in the prisons, and they had a psychiatrist check and see whether or not they were dangerous. If they were not dangerous, they put them in a fort there. Without any walls around it. And not even having the doors locked during the daytime. And I think what Senator Stahmer has in mind is, we need to start programs similar to that as quickly as possible. And I don't believe that it's in our budget. We could have a unit like in Omaha, at Fort Omaha. We could have unit like that in the airport out here. There's a building for it. Which is both buildings would be better than at...the ones we saw at Des Moines. And this is the kind of program that I think that Senator Stahmer feels that we should start. And in that regard I think he's 100% correct.

PRESIDENT: Senators this is the last one I'll recognize, and then we will go on back to Senator Marvel for discussion of the next part of the bill. Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, and fellow members, I sort of agree with Senator Whitney. I made the trip to Des Moines. And I was with the Judiciary Committee and the Budget Committee when we visited the State Penitentiary at the minimum security unit. And they said plainly we don't need anymore cages. We need programs to rehabilitate people. So I think we have enough cages now. Let's have more programs to help these people.

PRESIDENT: That finishes the discussion of this section. And Senator Marvel.

SENATOR MARVEL: Let's turn to page 30
