PRESIDENT: Do you have any discussion on the first part of the issue? That is the \$25,000 as the Chair understands it for the paralegal program. Senator Fellman.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Would Senator Goodrich yield to a couple of questions?

SENATOR GOODRICH: Yes.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Who is going to do the training?

SENATOR GOODRICH: The training will not be in the law school as which I am anticipating that you are going to ask.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Just tell me, don't tell me where it won't be, but tell me where it will be.

SENATOR GOODRICH: The Arts College where the regular academic setting is.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Then this will be a vocational program in the Arts College.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Wait a minute, let me finish that. See for example there are some courses that will have to have a lawyer trained, or conduct so there will be, while it is in the academic setting, it will have to have some cooperation by the law school which has been recommended this way of setting it up has been recommended as Mr. Shaneyfelt, one of the Deans or Associate Deans of the Law School.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Would these be college students that are being trained? Or....

SENATOR GOODRICH: Anyone that goes to the school at the University is a college student, whether it be in the form of a say, a student working for their bachelors degree or beyond the bachelors degree or actually working for or as a legal secretary they could be send from the law office for example to a night program to get this training from the law offices?

SENATOR FELLMAN: Then you get a bachelor of arts degree with a major in paralegal training?

SENATOR GOODRICH: There would be three stages that this could be set up in. One would be a one year course, one would be a two year course and one would be a four year course. If you went the full four year course you would get a bachelor of arts but you are right.

SENATOR FELLMAN: Within the college of arts and sciences. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this approach would be completely backwards to any productive end whatsoever. If the paralegals are to be licensed and put on stream as assistant lawyers, there should be specifications that are needed by the law profession as to what a paralegal is. When
