PRESIDENT: If you are in favor of the amendment vote aye, if not vote no. You are voting on the Goodrich amendment. Voting on the Goodrich amendment. And that portion of the amendment which involves \$160,000. Once again the Chair would inquire if you have all voted. Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: I have two more of them coming here Here comes another one. Keep it open. We need four more.

PRESIDENT: Have you all voted. Once again have you all voted. Clerk will record. All right. Read the results.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 3 nays, remainder not voting.

PRESIDENT: Senator Duis, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, I'm going to rise on a point of order for the rules committee. We are going to go along here I'm sure there are 15 or 16 more amendments up there for this bill, and I'm going to ask the Chair if you might limit the discussion on this floor and stop this back and forth business. If I understand the rules correctly, each person is allowed to speak twice, and the maximum time is ten minutes. And I don't think this calls for one person getting up and asking 15 questions and getting answers back, and engaging in dialogue back and forth. I'm not trying to stop the discussion, but I think we must do it in the parliamentary procedure here, or we are going to be here forever, because I want to be sure that everyone has equal opportunity. That the rules be followed, please.

PRESIDENT: Senator Duis, the Chair is going to recognize your suggestion, and I thank you and I will try to accomplish that and I think that the body also understands how extremely difficult it is, when in this particular instance most of the discussion was carried by the introducer of the amendment, and I don't know that under the rules there's a limit to the amount to the questioning that to which he can respond. And that of course is a difficult position in which the Chair finds itself. We will move on now to the next amendment to the bill.

CLERK: The next amendment, Mr. President is an amendment offered by Senator Cavanaugh. Identified by amendment #6 and found on page 1319 of the legislative journal.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, the Chair recognizes Senator Cavanaugh. Senator Dickinson, your light is still on, and I don't know is there some reason you want to be recognized.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I just turned it on, I want to speak to Senator Cavanaugh.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. All right, I thought it was left on from the previous issue. Thank you, Sir. Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well, I obviously have some contribution already. This amendment would change the language for providing the services in the area the elderly and foster care..child care
