are talking about providing child care to those persons in the Welfare category, in the ADC category. And it is their feeling in order to do equitably administer child care throughout the state, if the state is going to be providing funds, they to also provide the services in those localities of the state, where perhaps it is not profitable for private individuals to develop child care businesses from which they may purchase the services, and also there perhaps is no desire on the part of the local governmental agencies to establish those services from whom they can purchase them. So that if there is no person or entity from whom to purchase the services they would like to have the flexibility to be in the position, if there is a need to directly provide those services. The amendment on as page 18, which pertains to ages, blind or disabled. It is also their feeling that there are direct services which the state may find necessary to provide, I believe that they are talking about the kind of services here, such as home handy man, home nurse care, transportation, meal services, those kind of things that are being administered through those programs and if there is no local vehicle through which to purchase those services, they would also like to be in a position to purchase those. I think that's that is a less emotional issue than child care in that you do have certain philosophical differences apparently in the body as to whether or not the state would directly provide child care or whether they should go out and purchase it. I don't believe that that philosophical animosity exists in the area of the aged, blind and disabled. I move the adoption of both the amendments, and divide the question.

PRESIDENT: And we are discussing only the first two sentences of that now. Senator Duis.
