did you've got the problem again. I'm wanting to know if that's really what you mean, or if you want to divide your amendment up, because if you ask for a division of the question, you have to ask on each part separately and then the question as a whole.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Cavanaugh. So do you want to make it clear. You are dividing your motion into two parts, or is this a division of the question.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well, what's the effect. I don't know the difference.

SENATOR DUIS: Well, the easiest way for you to do it. Would be to divide your amendment. Because in a division of the question you have a problem, because you have to argue each one separately and then your amendment as a whole.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: O.K. Divide the amendment then, if that's what...

PRESIDENT: We're voting then on the first two sentences of the Cavanaugh amendment. Senator DeCamp, do you have a question?

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, I have a question of the Chair then. We now have two separate issues, and as I understand it we are going to vote on the first one, which is child care, and I did not know he was closing, and therefore, I am wondering since we have divided the question. We have two separate issues. Do we have any right to discuss the first issue. Because he is going to be closing, I would assume and having discussion on the separate one, and I'm well, think we have been afforded a proper opportunity to discuss the separate issues now that we have them separate.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp, I think you have a point, but the problem is that I very clearly stated that he was now closing that there were no more lights on, there were no more questions. That some place in this body the discussion has to terminate and now were down to that point, and he is now dividing his amendment and we are voting on the first two sentences only, and unless you have some question as to procedure....

SENATOR DECAMP: O.K. I'm not allowed to ask a question of Senator Cavanaugh, is that correct? Or make any statements on the first issue, which is now being discussed separately.

PRESIDENT: That's right, no statements on the first one. Or do you have a question on order..

SENATOR DECAMP: Like what happens on the second one.

PRESIDENT: Well, we will get to that when we get to it then.

SENATOR DECAMP: Shit.

PRESIDENT: You are voting on the first half of the amendment. The first two sentences of the amendment #6 on page 1319. All in favor of that vote aye. All those opposed vote no. You are voting on the two sentences, the first two sentences to the Cavanaugh amendment. Now, have you all voted? All right. I see a lot of people moving around, I don't want to close the
