PRESIDENT: Senator Nore and then Senator Dickinson.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President, I'd like to ask Senator Cavanaugh a question.

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh yield to a question.

SENATOR NORE: Will this solve the problem...I had a letter from Mrs. Kitter over at Elkhorn. And I understand the older part the lower part of the town, some of those folks are getting up some mornings with sewage in their basement. From some developer I understand it's above them. I don't remember the letter exactly My secretary is not here tonight, I don't think she is. Or I could get it, but I'm interested in solving these people's problem at Elkhorn Nebraska. They have a real problem and I'm hoping this she says vote for the amendment. Is this right? Will this solve their problem at Elkhorn, Nebraska?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Well, I would hope that it would solve their problem, Senator Nore. It's just...I'm the introducer of the bill and I'm sorry that Senator Cavanaugh's amendment in it's final form has not been printed in the Journal, so that those people interested have had a chance to be aware of what it did. Senator Cavanaugh may I ask you a question. The amendment as in the Journal certainly wouldn't be acceptable to developers. Have you have... what..I haven't had anybody contact me. Have you? In stringent opposition to this?

PRESIDENT: Senator Cavanaugh.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: SID work, who represent SID, they were not contacting me in the capacity of representing their SID. But simply to inform me of some difficulties they sought SID's would have with the amendment as originally proposed, and they thought they would have less difficulty with the amendment that I subsequently submitted, or am now offering.
