SENATOR CHAMBERS: You are answering satisfactorily. Senator Dickinson, if an SID is in an area that is annexed by the city. What becomes of the debt of the SID.

SENATOR DICKINSON: The city assumes them. But normally, Senator Chambers, in almost all cases, if not all, the city refuses to annex these areas until they're levy to cover their bond indebtedness or whatever their obligation that they have is equal to or lower than the existing city levy. And this has been true at MILLARD, Omaha and the areas around where the cities have ultimately annexed SID's

SENATOR DICKINSON: Fire. I have all night.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm not going to take all night. Because I don't have it. Senator Dickinson, are there abuses in the SID system, and is there any these abuses could be corrected other than by what I'm trying to do with this amendment.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I'm sure there's been some concern on the parts of the residents that there may have been ...I can't answer that positively either...there may have been some unhappy residents in some areas where they have built things and the mill levy gradually assented up to a point where the homeowner thought he was being assessed too highly, and again, this will be corrected. We believe by the fact that resident owners will have a voice in electing the Board of Trustees and they will have some control over what they do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And here is my final question, so that the body would know what is being done, if this amendment is adopted. Would the adoption of this amendment in affect, kill the bill.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Your amendment, Senator Chambers?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Yes, in affect would.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Dickinson, since I've had the opportunity to express my concerns I would ask unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment.
