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the sand like a bunch of ostriches. If we try to prevent someone from doing something that is perfectly legal in their homes and then try to guise them the fact that we are preventing it. We are not. And even the public, believe it or not is going to understand that. And many of them do.

CLERK: After the amendment, the first would be page line 2, page 2, lines 18 to 22.

PRESIDENT: Read the amendment.

CLERK: The Carpenter amendment on page 2 lines 18 through 22 Re-instate the Stricken Matter Lines 22 and 23 strike the new matter.

PRESIDENT: Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR STAHMER: No response.

PRESIDENT: We seem to be in some agreement up here, that this question is not divisible because this...well it would just be extremely difficult to do that. Now, if you want to move to amend it, fine, but other than that I don't know how we can divide it technically here.

SENATOR STAHMER: Well, Senator Fowler divided it in his explanation And if he can divide, I don't see why you can't.

PRESIDENT: Well, because it isn't my amendment.

SENATOR STAHMER: You are dealing with two different sections. There.

CLERK: No. No., it's all the same thing. One prohibits liquor and the other permits it.

SENATOR STAHMER: But, I mean, speaking of the public as opposed to the private.

CLERK: It has nothing to do with that. It's on page 2, one would strike the new matter and the other one would reinstate the stricken matter.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter. We are ready for your amendment here for 783.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, Mr. Chairman, I don't know if I'm a fool or not, but there is some question about it. But I do know, that to permit the sale of liquors in any public or private school on the premises in the student body, or anywhere else insofar as even those people who drink. Even those people that drink to excess are not in favor of it. Under no consideration would I vote for this bill unless you eliminated the possibility of allowing the University with or without the permission of the Board of Regents, or others in a similar position to sell this stuff in the area, and make it anymore available than it now is. Now I would agree that these people for the most part are adults. Many of them are not adults. In the Universities. And I realize that young people are citizens now by our vote, no one in this body has had anymore experience with alcohol and liquor than I
