I know that about 75 or 80% in this country do drink to some unknown extent, and that's their problem, not mine. And under no consideration would I vote for this bill, unless you accept this amendment and strike the sale and the opportunity and the things that are obvious there by making it available where they have to walk by it all the time.'

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion of the Carpenter amendment. Senator Frank Lewis, do you want to discuss the Carpenter amendment. Please turn off your light. Thank you. Senator Stahmer do you want to discuss the Carpenter amendment. All right please turn off your light. We are discussing the Carpenter amendment to this...is there any further discussion. Senator Carpenter has asked for a Roll Call vote on the amendment.

CLERK: The amendment is to, on page 2, line 18 to 22, Re-instate the Stricken Matter and strike the new matter, in lines 22 and 23. 27 ayes, 12 nays and 10 not voting.

PRESIDENT: The Carpenter amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Now, Mr. President, motion on the desk.

PRESIDENT: Read the motion on the desk.

CLERK: I move to indefinitely postpone LB783, signed Senator Chambers.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature. This is something that I promised Senator Cavanaugh and Senator Fowler I would do when I first became aware of the bills introduction. I believe that it is the kind of issue where each person knows what he or she is going to do. I doubt that anything that I could say would persuade somebody to vote to kill the bill, who is not already inclined to do so. I doubt that anything that anybody else will say will persuade somebody to vote for the bill, who is not inclined to do so. So unless there are questions, I've made the motion and I ask that you indefinitely postpone this bill.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Whitney and then Senator Kelly.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. The Board of Regents of the University of Nebraska has taken a stand on this, and I feel that this Legislature should not overrule the Board of Regents. The Board of REgents represent an elected body, and they are more familiar with the situation in my judgement than the members of the Legislature are, and with what does happen when this kind of thing occurs, and therefore I feel that we should conform to what the Board of Regents desires and that means to kill the bill.

PRESIDENT: Next to speak is Senator Kelly. The motion is to indefinitely postpone the bill.

SENATOR KELLY Question of Senator Chambers.
