PRESIDENT: Senator Duis, the Chair is treating it as an amendment.

SENATOR DUIS: Oh, I'm sorry.

PRESIDENT: Unless you see some objection to that.

SENATOR DUIS: No. No. Not at all.

PRESIDENT: He's either got the 25 votes, or he hasn't. Any further discussion on this? All right are you ready for the question? The question is, the Mahoney amendment. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote no. It's on page 1333, Mr. Clerk. It's on page 1333. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 6 nays, Mr. President. Now, Mr. President there is an amendment offered by Senator Mahoney found on page 1405 which I understand he now wishes to withdraw.

SENATOR MAHONEY: No,

CLERK: That's what I got.

SENATOR MAHONEY: Yes, to withdraw first, and then to reapply the other amendment.

CLERK: This is amendment #22 found on page 1504

PRESIDENT: Senator Mahoney. Is this your amendment Senator Mahoney. Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: It is, but it is not in the Journal.

CLERK: Well, but we've got to withdraw the one that's pending.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Mahoney,....

SENATOR MAHONEY: That was the original amendment which calls for the funds that was voted down here last week, was the Goodrich program of the University. That is to be withdrawn.

CLERK: That's withdrawn.

PRESIDENT: That's withdrawn.

CLERK: Mr. President, I move to adopt the following amendment on page 62, after line 25 insert the following (read)

SENATOR MAHONEY: Mr. President, this program is a program that has worked very well at Omaha University in the last two years. It's a program that...this amendment will allow 50 new students of the freshman class this program to get started into University with the tuition remission plan. This is giving them permission to use federal funds for this particular tuition. And it will help the students in their first year in the plan which is particularly students that have problems being able to go to University, in a municipal city. These people who come to this program are from the ghetto area.
