PRESIDENT: Senator Clark.

SENATOR CLARK: I think it's been discussed very well. I move the previous question.

PRESIDENT: The previous question has been called for. Do I see five hands? Clerk will clear the board. All those in favor of ceasing debate vote aye. Those opposed vote no. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 4 nays.

PRESIDENT: Debate is ceased. Senator Kime, you may close.

SENATOR KIME: Mr. Chairman, Sheriff Janing is probably one of the best sheriffs in the United States....Probably has the most scientific method of investigating and the most up to date. And he keeps his deputies well qualified and educated. He has one now as I just told you a few minutes ago capable of taking care of this jail and going right ahead with it. As I said before, dividing the administration of this jail is a two-headed monster and would cause a lot of trouble. Now I, if this County Board creates this Board of Corrections, they'll have to have an administrator. I don't know how much. Maybe \$20,000. He'll have to have secretaries, he'll have to have some deputy to help him. He'll have to have office space. The fiscal impact is \$50,000 or up for Douglas County. Now there's one thing that I forgot to tell you. I didn't forget to tell you but I want to call your attention to. Putting these men in jail and holding them up to their time of sentence is not the end. When you pick up a burglar or suspect or cattle thief or anybody else, a bank robber, you put him in jail there but that's not the end. You study his...his job that he did and the way that he did it. You also have unsolved crimes perhaps from out over the state. If the modus operandi of this man is the same as those out over the state. You can bet pretty close that he's the one that did those jobs too. Many times after questioning these men, you can clear up a half dozen burglaries throughout the state. It's necessary for the sheriff to have control of these men or the police chief from the time they pick him up until they go to prison or wherever they might go. For those reasons, I urge you to go ahead and kill this bill.

PRESIDENT: The motion is, Senator Kim's motion, to strike the enacting clause. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote no. Have you all voted? This requires 25 votes. Senator Kime.

SENATOR KIME: Call of the House, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kime has moved for a Call of the House. Clerk will clear the board. All those in favor of a Call of the House vote aye. Those opposed vote no. Motion is for a Call of the House. Have you all voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 23 ayes, 14 nays, for Call of the House.

PRESIDENT: Motion passes. The House is under Call. At the next bell, please indicate your presence. Please indicate your presence. The House is under Call. Sergeant at Arms will please bring in the absent members. Senator Carpenter.
