SENATOR CARPENTER: Now, Mr. President, I have a technical school in my district which includes a junior college and when they made the change, at least I presume the board did, the technical school board, they automatically....almost... they didn't wound our school but they certainly didn't help it any. Because it's strange to me that \$100 scholarship is the difference between a lot of people (young) going to a technical school and a junior college or not going. And I'm in favor of what Senator Marvel is trying to do. Because my people are upset about it. And so is the School Board and particularly the students are. And I never realized \$100 tuition was the difference, at least at the school in my district, between going to this school and not going. Because \$100 to me doesn't mean as much apparently as it does to those who are trying to get an education. And I just don't understand how we did it in the first place. And it is true like all athletics whether it's here or the University of Nebraska or wherever, they go out to get athletes. And they pick them up by recruiting. And I think the State of Nebraska ought to do the same thing insofar as this basketball team is concerned. We've got a stadium of 18,000. If we're ever going to fill it up, we've got to get a good coach. We've got to get a team that'll draw and attract people to it like we got a football team. That's the reason I tried to build this stadium. You can't separate athletics from any schools. That's almost as much a part of it as the curriculum is. I don't think that's the way it ought to be but that's the way it is and I hope you will adopt Senator Marvel's motion.

PRESIDENT: Senator Savage.

SENATOR SAVAGE: Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I oppose this motion for the reason that I think the voc-tech schools are for the purpose of academic training Nebraska people how to get jobs. To be able to work at jobs. And it was sort of a shock to me to pick up the Fairbury paper and find out that about twelve of their basketball team were imported from all the world. One from Jamaica, one from the Bahamas, three from Florida, three from Maine and only one of those athletes stayed in Nebraska. I think for all the academic scholarships that the Legislature, that the taxpayers of this state can afford. And we did give, allow ten academic scholarships for each of the voc-tech schools but I am opposed to importing basketball players from all over the world for them to return to their home states. Instead of training our own men and women in Nebraska to qualify for jobs here. I think that's the purpose for the voc-tech school.

PRESIDENT: Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR STAHMER: Mr. President, I would like to ask Senator Marvel if he would answer a question or two to help clarify my thinking. Senator Marvel, I'm neither now for or against the amendment. Quite possibly I will support it but basically is it tuition remission money that could be used either for and/or...for scholarships and/or athletic remission? Is that true? I'm not sure what your...if I
