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where they're making it, how much time they're putting in, etc. We have a man, I read in the paper, that was working for the county surveyor of Omaha full time. I don't know how much he was making but he's a professor teaching at the University of Nebraska at Omaha and making full time...working full time there and full time for the county treasurer. Now, you can't work two jobs full time and both of them happen to be daytime jobs. We also have people who are working at the University who are advisors to this Legislature that are working practically full time. I don't know when they're doing any work at the University. I can see them here practically every day we're in session. We have some men on the medical staff in Omaha that are making thousands and thousands and thousands of dollars working away from the state and yet drawing a salary from the state. So that's the reason I've asked for this. I think it'll be one of the best things.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, Mr. President, I rise to support the amendment. And I think one of the reasons for the amendment in my judgment is there's some people who believe that other people making as much as \$100,000 a year in the area of abortions. And there's a great group of people who believe that the University shouldn't be used for this purpose. And I'm one of them. And I think this bill ought to be passed in order to let those divulge to the people of this state and the University what they make where they make more than \$10,000 by their activities above their salary. Now I think we ought to clear the air as to whether or not this is truth or fiction and sometimes fiction becomes worse than the truth. And I would think that is one of the purposes of this bill and it's the one reason I support it in order to find out what's going on in the area of abortions in the University of Nebraska Medical School. Now there's other areas but this is where my interest is and that's the reason I support it. And I ask for a Roll Call vote.

PRESIDENT: Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Well, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. Having worked at the University of Nebraska for many years and two other other universities in different states, I realize that there's time when a school administration like the University of Nebraska wants to hire some real good man who's making money elsewhere. And they can't hire that good man because...if there's going to be laws like this, in my judgment. He'll just turn them down. And who's going to be the loser, it's going to be the students that are going to be the loser so I'm opposed to this particular amendment. Now, the University of Nebraska it seems to me should be able to manage its own institution. And here again we're trying to stick our nose into the management of the University of Nebraska and I am opposed to it.

PRESIDENT: Senator Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: Mr. Speaker, I'm concerned because if a man has been somewhere else and has written a book and is receiving royalties, it's really none of our business how much he's receiving in royalties when he comes to the University of Nebraska. And I'm thinking about the Chancellor of the University here in Lincoln right now. I think this is not our business. If we want to know about it, then it should be an internal problem and someone should go directly
