

SPEAKER: 25 Ayes, did you say Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Yes.

SPEAKER: The motion carries, and the bill is advanced, Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: A point of personal privilege. My point is that there was quite a surge of not raising the sales tax I believe when state support for schools, and I believe that this will do that won't it?

SPEAKER: Clerk will read LB705.

CLERK: LB705 is Senator Chamber's bill and he is not here Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Lets hold the bill unless somebody wants to take it in for Senator Chambers. Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR STAHMER: I move to advance Senator Chamber's bill, if you want to you can kill it on Select File out of courtesy to him.

SPEAKER: Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I have an amendment on that bill.

CLERK: There are a bunch of amendments if you are going to take it up Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Well now Senator Chambers has just arrived in the chamber.

CLERK: Read LB705.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the legislature, may I explain everything at one swoop on this bill?

SPEAKER: You have ten minutes and you can do whatever you want.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It is not going to take ten minutes. This bill in its original form was to abolish the requirement for a graduate of Nebraska Law School to take a bar exam. That has been changed. After meeting with some Supreme Court Judges, a rule was adopted by the state Supreme Court which said that a person who takes a bar examination..

SPEAKER: (bangs gavel) Senator Chambers is speaking.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I don't mind at all, in fact in the confusion, we operate better under confusion. This bill now allows for an appeal procedure for anybody denied the right to practice law. It says that when a bar examination is given, ten days after the exam, the questions are to be published which the Supreme Court has agreed too, and it states that anybody taking the bar exam has a right to see a corrected paper. These are what you might call due process requirements relating to fairness as far as the bar exam is concerned. The other provision of the bill is an amendment offered by Senator Luedtke which is merely a repealer. A bill was vetoed by the Governor subsequently overridden by this body and based on the repealer
