

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays.

SPEAKER: Amendment is adopted. Any further amendments Mr. Clerk? Senator DeCamp, withdraws the motion. Any further amendments?

CLERK: None.

SPEAKER: Fine, Senator Chambers do you want to explain the bill or have you?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Proud, I have explained it and for those that want to punish me, you may vote against this bill and as Senator Carpenter says I have no interest in it, you can kill it and you can tear it up into little pieces, burn up the pieces and make ashes and spray them to the four winds. Have your fun, I don't care what you do with it.

SPEAKER: Senator F. Carstens.

SENATOR F. CARSTENS: Mr. President, members, I would have to oppose this bill. I think that the Supreme Court has adopted the rules that were requested by Senator Chambers which are embodied in this bill, and I do not believe that it is the better part of wisdom to incorporate this into statutory laws. We should leave the regulation of the qualification of the bar to the Supreme Court as it has been. I believe that it would be better to not advance this bill and let it die.

SPEAKER: Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Senator Carstens, would you yield to a question? Did you listen to the amendment that I put on, which the court asked to be put on so that the court actually asked that this amendment be passed so that if the bill is worth nothing more than the amendment, then it is worth passing because we need it to correct this other bill. It is the only bill that we can attach it too when the time came to do it. So would you go along with letting the bill go across the board so that we can at least have this amendment? This section 2 read as we have just adopted it?

SENATOR F. CARSTENS: I don't know how you can justify the passing a bill which in my mind is questionable to gain an amendment, this is an improper place. I just don't see how the Supreme Court got mixed up in this. I don't understand it at all now.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: They asked me to do it Senator Carsten.

SPEAKER: Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President, I wonder if we can work out a compromise here and just simply strike the committee amendments then leave Senator Luedtke's amendment on the bill. I would like to ask Senator F. Carstens a question. Is it the committee amendment which delatenates all the procedures necessary there that you are objecting too?

SENATOR F. CARSTENS: Are you asking me does it?

SENATOR WHITNEY: Yes, is this what you are objecting too?
