

advancing the bill vote aye. All those opposed vote no. Voting on the advancement of LB1040 from Select File. Have you all voted? Thank you. Clerk will record.

CLERK: 26 ayes to advance.

PRESIDENT: Bill is advanced. Brings up for Select File consideration LB681.

CLERK: LB681. Mr. President, there are E & R amendments to be adopted.

PRESIDENT: Senator Stull moves for the adoption of E & R amendments to LB681. All those in favor of the adoption of the E & R amendments please say aye. Those opposed please say no. Ayes have it, so ordered, the E & R amendments are adopted.

CLERK: Now, Mr. President, there are amendments offered by Senator Carpenter that are found on page 681....well, they're offered to the 681. They are probably in your bill book attached to LB758. They are computer print out.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I ask the Clerk to read only the new and stricken matter. I might say that these amendments have the approval of the Liquor Commission. They were introduced at their request.

CLERK: The first amendment, Mr. President, deals with the salaries of the members of the Commission. (Clerk read amendment). The next amendment appears to strike the wine license requirement.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Mr. President, what this does, is that the Liquor Commissioners now, two of them come from outstate. One in Omaha for example. The other is somewhere in the area of Ogallala or some similar place. What this amendment would do in part would allow them to be repaid and reimbursed for their actual expenditures insofar as travel and things of that nature are concerned. The other part, the other two parts only permits the changing of the advertising insofar as time is concerned, that's all that does. The last provision, as the law now stands, they close at 1:00 a.m. but there's nothing there which would give the Commission any way to be sure that the people will be out of those places which serve liquor, at 1:00 from the standpoint of consumption. They have a problem so I understand now where people stay in the place a long time after the closing hours. This would allow them, as I recall, thirty minutes to get out and to get the place cleaned and get the people on their way back home. I move for the adoption of the amendments.

PRESIDENT: Chair recognizes Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR STAHMER: Mr. President, I'd like to ask to have Senator Carpenter yield to a question if he would.

PRESIDENT: Senator Carpenter yield?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Yes.

SENATOR STAHMER: There was motion or mention in your amendments about something about striking the licenses for wine.
