CLERK: Now, Mr. President, I move to bracket LB997 and 997A, signed Senator Kennedy.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Kennedy for his motion on 997 and 997A. Senator Kennedy.

SENATOR KENNEDY: I just move to bracket that bill be held. 997 and 997A.

PRESIDENT: All right, Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR STAHMER: I previously had a motion on that bill. To unbracket it.

CLERK: Well, it was unbracketed.

PRESIDENT: Well, it is unbracketed.

SENATOR STAHMER: All right, then I'd like to speak against the motion. I think our Wiltse motion was to go over to Final Reading and get lost.

PRESIDENT: Wiltse?

SENATOR STAHMER: Well, I'd like to speak against now against this motion on 977. To bracket it. I have amendments on it dealing with the Voc Tech schools. I think the Voc Tech schools are one of the most important things in this state and I think we ought address ourselves to those motions. And for that reason I'd oppose to bracketing at this motion and this time, and if you want to vote up or down on the bill itself that's another thing.

PRESIDENT: Are you all through discussing the motion to bracket 997 and 997A. Excuse me 977. Right. 977 and 977A Correct, Senator Kennedy? All right. Senator Stahmer for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR STAHMER: Can I amend that motion to have that two bills read at this time?

PRESIDENT: No. No. No. Question is, do you want to bracket the two bills on Final Reading. 977 and 977A. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I just want to ask a question. Why do you want to bracket them.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kennedy, the question is, why do you want to bracket the bills.
