SENATOR DICKINSON: Mr. President, members of the body, would Senator Whitney yield to a question? What are the duties and responsibilities of this appointee?

SENATOR WHITNEY: It is primarily that of taking care of the licensing of those persons involved in the motor vehicles it is a motor vehicle industry licensing board.

SENATOR DICKINSON: You are talking about dealers licenses now?

SENATOR WHITNEY: Yes. Dealers licenses and he happens to be in the motorcycle business, and...

SENATOR DICKINSON: Is this a job that carries a salary or expenses or waht?

SENATOR WHITNEY: Well as I recall it only...if it has any salary at all it would just be a very nominal amount and be...the expenses of carrying on the business of the state. Now the point is that the law requires that there be a man representing the motorcycle industry and this man is a dealer in motorcycles here in Lincoln. He sells them and he repairs them. The Governor is quite restricted in trying to find people who are in this business and how or who have a knowledge of that business. So this man then is selected on that basis.
