(Start Belt #8)

PRESIDENT: The bill is passed.

CLERK: Mr. President. A motion on the desk.

PRESIDENT: Read the motion on the desk.

CLERK: Not a motion, but a letter..communication.

PRESIDENT: Read the letter.

CLERK: From the Executive office dated April 11, 1974 (read) Printed on page 1669 of Journal. Mr. President, your Committee on Enrollment and Review reports we have examined and reviewed LB 894, 932, 933 all correctly enrolled. Mr. President your Enrolling Clerk reports that she did on this date present to the Governor a series of bills, signed Barbara Enrolling Clerk.

PRESIDENT: Stand by. While the Legislature was in session and capable of transacting business, the President signed: LB 894, 932 and 933.

CLERK: Motion on the desk, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Read the motion on the desk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I move that we override the Governor's veto on LB ...correction...I move that LB1053 become law notwithstanding the standing objections of the Governor. Signed, Senator Carpenter.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Mr. President. I have made the same motion on all three bills. And do with the full understanding of the responsibility as a Senator, citizen and a candidate for political office. I will only make one closing on all three bills. Between now and the closing I will yield to other Senators who want to discuss the contents of the vetoes themselves. I'm only interested in the basic facts. The overall policy. And the overall public acceptance of the responsibilities of all of us elected to the public office. My only request is that I be allowed to close.

PRESIDENT: Yes. Sir. The Chair recognizes Senator Stahmer. The motion is to pass LB1053 to become law, notwithstanding the objection of the Governor. Senator Stahmer has the floor.

SENATOR STAHMER: Mr. President, and members of the body. I don't expect to get very far with this suggestion, but I'm going to throw it out anyway. I did not vote in favor of meeting today. I voted in favor of giving the Governor's staff plenty of time. But the position, I as a member of the Budget Committee find myself in, and I have this letter on my desk. And I personally think the Budget Committee ought to have time, and other Senators have more time to analyze. I have not made up my mind. I have
