we have asked for A bills but it is also my understanding that they are usually \$50,000 or more and that is the reason that we did not address this subject right now. I have also watched this body on several occasions when this happened early in session, they advance the bill itself and hold it in a certain area until the A bill was able to catch up with it.

SENATOR MURPHY: I would prefer that we remain with our rules if we might, Senator Koch. I think we make some of our finest mistakes when we abandon our rules in favor of expediency particularly when we have, if you will excuse the expression, seventy eight days left.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: The Chair recognizes Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President and colleagues, I will not address this question to Senator Koch because he can refer to it in the closing but I would like to have him touch on it just a little bit in the closing. I support the concept of what Senator Koch is doing 100%. The only question I have which I will defer to Senator Koch in the closing is to why they should go to the Department of Public Institutions rather than possibly the Department of Education or possibly the Educational T.V. Commission. The thing that bothers me a little bit about this type of thing as we have done in other situations up to this time is we get a program started by about eight different agencies. I think minimum stream flow legislation is a good example of that. We have got three or four agencies involved in this and we are spreading our dollars so darn thin over the waterfront that I don't think we are really getting the impact and I will be very truthful. I am personally philosophically not opposed to public radio and I know this is not a public radio bill but I think that is an inevitability down the road some time and if it is, if this body decides or the people in Nebraska decide, I would like to see it all in one area rather than D.P.I. doing part of it, the Department of Education doing part of it and whoever else gets into it and so that is the only objection I have and the only question I have as to why this should be in D.P. I. rather than an agency that could handle all public radio transmission.
