certainly seemed to lean in that direction and because of that, Mr. President, I am asking that LB 459 be withdrawn.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Any further discussion on the motion to withdraw LB 459? Senator Cullan, did you wish to speak?

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President, I am sorry. I did not hear Senator Simon's explanation. I do apologize, Senator Simon. I wonder if you could just repeat that.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Senator Simon, would you one more time?

SENATOR SIMON: Yes, for the benefit of Senator Cullan and others. Senator Cullan, what I said was LB 459 which was the advertising bill placing restrictions on private power, the Attorney General's opinion #8 seemed to indicate although it did not, as you know, the opinions very rarely say yes or no, seemed to indicate that the bill had constitutional problems and was constitutionally suspect. I, therefore, as chairman of the committee respect those opinions and ask that the bill be withdrawn.

SENATOR CULLAN: Okay, thank you very much, Senator Simon. I apologize for making you repeat it. Thank you.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Any further discussion on the motion to withdraw? If not, all those in favor of the motion to withdraw LB 459 vote aye, opposed nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to withdraw, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Motion carries. LB 459 is withdrawn. Speaker Marvel, do you want to proceed with the next item under General File? We have about a little over five minutes, six, seven minutes. That is about all.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Pirsch, do you want to take it up now?

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Senator Pirsch, would you like to take up your bill?

SPEAKER MARVEL: Why don't I try?

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Proceed then, Mr. Clerk, with LB 150 on General File. Read the title.

CLERK: Read title to LB 150. The bill was read for the first time on January 9 of this year. It was referred to
