I urge you to accept my amendment to Senator Cullan's motion.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: The Chair will recognize Senator Duis. Now this is speaking to the motion of Senator Lamb to amend. Is that right, Senator Lamb?

SENATOR DUIS: I will wait until you have...I was going to ask for the question. Is there any other lights on up there?

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: (mike not working properly) whether they want to speak to the...I don't know whether any of these want to speak to the amendment or to the question. I will go down the line and find out then. Senator Fowler, do you wish to speak to the amendment? Senator Duis, did you still wish to speak?

SENATOR DUIS: I want to call for the question because I don't presume anybody wants to speak to the amendment.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: All right, do I see five hands? I see five hands. All right, the question then is, shall debate cease. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay on ceasing debate. Record the vote.

CLERK: 21 ayes, 10 nays on the motion to cease debate, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Motion fails. The debate continues but the debate is going to cease in a couple of minutes anyway so we only have a couple of minutes to go. Speaker Marvel, would you want to...?

SPEAKER MARVEL: I would like to get this decided before we adjourn so I would like to hold up the adjournment for a few moments and see if everybody else wants to speak and then let's vote on it and get it out of the way.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: We will proceed with the list of those who wish to speak on the amendment of Senator Lamb, so, Senator Fowler. He passes, so, Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, if I go through the five hundred or six hundred or however many bills there are, I can give you an argument on every single one why it should go to some other committee. Now, Sam brought up one aspect of what I told him. I said one of the factors, one of the factors in consideration was the work load of the committee. So Sam simplified that,
