We will proceed then with Final Reading on LB 150. Proceed then, Mr. Clerk, with the reading of LB 150 on Final Reading.

CLERK: Read LB 150 on Final Reading.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: All provisions of law relative to procedure having been complied with, the question is, shall LB 150 pass? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: (Read record vote found on page 413 of the Legislative Journal.) 32 ayes, 6 nays, 7 excused and not voting, 4 present and not voting, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: LB 150 passes. Yes, Mr. Clerk, do you have some things to read in?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator George asks unanimous consent to print amendments in the Legislative Journal. (See pages 413-415.)

PRESIDENT LUEDTKE: Are there any objections? If not, so ordered.
