Senator Stoney, you and I know and you are an insurance, when I say expert I am not trying to be facetious, you know they try to make calculations as to what rates ought to be but you know when you stated that these things cannot be figured out with precision in advance.

SPEAKER MARVEL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So if we are going to allow the insurance companies with their multimillions of dollars in premiums that they receive, their investments in real estate, their purchase of newspapers, publishing houses, resort areas and every other thing imaginable, we allow them to make educated estimates as to what is going to be required, why are we going to require such precision in an instance that involves those unfortunate people in this state that we have an obligation and a responsibility toward. I am opposed to Senator Stoney's amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Nichol and then Senator Haberman. Then I will go to Senator Stoney. Senator Nichol.

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, members of the Legislature, Senator Stoney, your amendment is dead. It is dead. It has been determined this is not a program that is going to end in three years. It is going to continue. What does a radio do? Generally a radio does three things. It provides people with music, news and advertising. All right, the blind can listen to radio and listen to the news. Stations have at least once an hour news programs, some of them every half hour have news programs. They can hear this on television. News. They are well taken care of as far as the news is concerned. Music, blind people can hear music as well as those of us who see. There is no need to pay for music for people who are blind. Thirdly, advertising, advertising should be paid for by those who do the advertising not by taxpayers in the State of Nebraska. This is the beginning of educational radio. You should listen to it.
