SENATOR WESELY: A question of Senator Vickers.

SENATOR VICKERS: Yes.

SENATOR WESELY: Could you tell me the opposition...the basis of the opposition to this bill?

SENATOR VICKERS: Well they wanted to wait quite frankly as long as possible because of the new valuations to come out. They wanted to see the new valuations before they set their mill levies, or before they set their budgets actually was about what it amounted to, Senator Wesely, but by changing the date to the 25th, they have agreed that they can live with that also, so...

SENATOR WESELY: So you don't see any problem with the different subdivisions?

SENATOR VICKERS: I am not aware of any problems, no.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Any other discussion? The motion is to advance LB 178 as amended to E & R for Review. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to advance, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried and the bill is advanced. Ready for LB 211.

CLERK: Legislative Bill 211 was a bill introduced by the Revenue Committee and signed by the members thereof. (Read by title LB 211.) The bill was first read on January 11. It was referred to the Revenue Committee. There are pending, Mr. President, committee amendments by Senator Carsten's Revenue Committee.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Carsten.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Mr. President, I move for the adoption of the committee amendments. The committee amendments were suggested by Mr. Noren who was representing the Technical Community College, and what it does is limit the information that is made available to cities and villages on the source of revenue that from which their operating money comes. The limit would be extended in addition to the cities and villages to the Natural Resource Districts,
