SENATOR NEWELL: I would like to try and see if we can end the debate on this and just see if we can resolve this question so I would call for the question if I could.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The question is the cessation of debate. All those in favor of ceasing debate vote aye. First of all, five hands. Okay, all those in favor of that motion vote aye, opposed no. There are seven excused. Record the vote.

CLERK: 19 ayes, 18 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to cease debate.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: Mr. President, I was enjoying Mr. Landis' presentation so much that I thought if he needed extra time I would give it to him even though he chilled me a little bit with his repeated references to the Commission on Industrial Relations, but inasmuch as he concluded his talk within his limitations, I have nothing to say at the moment. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President, I have nothing to say at this time.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Keyes, do you wish to speak to the kill motion?

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, I do, and I would like to have Senator Landis explain some things to me. And, of course, Senator Landis has two things that I would like to have, his youth and his eloquence. By the youth, I am persuaded by the youth in my own home so that sometimes I don't understand exactly what is going on. But, Senator Landis, if we kill the bill, will that mean that the colleges across the state, four of them, will bargain individually, if they have a union, they will bargain individually, as individual colleges, with management as a whole or with management of each individual college? And when you come to Omaha, the voc-tech school in Omaha which is going to have four campuses, will each of the campuses bargain with the administration of their campus or will they bargain collectively with the administration of the four campuses?
