

available to those residents is not at all in good order. That's like saying, the same way with automobile, if Senator Lamb is consistent, if a man uses an automobile only once or twice a year he should be able to license that only for one or two days rather than license the thing on a six month basis as it is now. I think the Lamb amendment, and the logic of the Lamb amendment is totally improper. I think it'll clutter the existing statutes, and I strongly urge you to defeat the Lamb amendment.

SENATOR LEWIS: Senator Reutzel.

SENATOR REUTZEL: Mr. President and members of the body, I did not mention also that in the bill we are doing away with two Missouri River permits and going to a...to a annual and short term resident fee to get around...one of the problems is we're sitting there printing more and more types of permits. It seems that we want a permit for every occasion, and we're doing away with several permits and consolidating them and now Senator Lamb's amendment would just have us print one more permit, so I...again, I hope the body would reject the Lamb amendment.

SENATOR LEWIS: Senator Lamb, do you care to close and reply?

SENATOR LAMB: Yes, Mr. President. I'm not sure how many people are listening, Mr. Chairman.

SENATOR LEWIS: I think that's a good point. Senator Lamb is closing and replying on his amendment. I'd appreciate, and so would he, if you would....the issue at hand.

SENATOR LAMB: I'd like to point out that the amendment I have offered would require a three day permit...three day fishing permit, which is not now provided for in the statutes. We are providing a three day permit for nonresidents, but we are not doing the same thing for our residents. We are discriminating against our residents. Now, Senator Dworak says that we should not have a three day permit because the resident can fish all year round, and that's true, however, some of us are not fishermen, and the only time we fish is when people come in from out of state. It may be the only time we'd want to fish is when someone comes in from out of state. If my grandson would come in from Washington and wanted to fish for three days, I'd like to be able to fish for that period of time without buying a yearly permit for seven dollars and fifty cents. The out of state person can come into Nebraska, fish for six dollars for the weekend, whereas if I wanted to accompany a relative that comes in from out of the state to
