I want to make it for the record, Senator Reutzel.

SENATOR REUTZEL: My interpretation...I'm only one person.

SENATOR REUTZEL: If the Legislature wants to put that amendment in, I think that clarifies it.

SENATOR NICHOL: Alright, but so far that's what the bill does say?

SENATOR REUTZEL: My interpretation.
