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it difficult for the law enforcement officers. Now I don't think that most of us would be too concerned with somebody having a speeding ticket or having been arrested for something of this nature and would deny them the privilege of employment for this reason. However, as the legal counsel for the State Patrol pointed out, many times law enforcement officers cooperate with each other both within the state and from outside the state to find various people who have been committing crimes and have been arrested for a similar crime and may be in this area. When the record is expunged, of course they no longer have access to this information, nor do they have access to this information from other areas that may want it from Nebraska. I agree with Senator Johnson, the bill was lousily written and I don't know if it has been attempted to be doctored up. It would be my suggestion that if this should be handled and passed by this Legislature, it should have some work on it done and I don't know whether it can be done this quickly to have us pass a reasonable bill. I would suggest, Senator Johnson, if you would like to have hearings on this particular bill, it might be well to have those in the interim and then come in with something a little cleaner next year. I don't like coming into this Legislature with bills that are not quite clean although I guess most of us have been guilty of this from time to time and it is okay if we can doctor it up in time. So for this reason I object to bringing this out of committee.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Reutzel.

SENATOR REUTZEL: Mr. President and members of the body, as one of the members of the Judiciary Committee who was absent, I rise in support of Senator Johnson's motion. At the time this was considered I was in the Speaker's office. We were working on LB 316. I was there for part of the hearing that day on this bill and it seemed to me that there was some confusion during the time I was there over the difference between conviction and arrest. There is a big difference and this bill can make a big impact and I don't think we should penalize people for being arrested if they have not been convicted. I think for penalizing them in future job applications and I arise in support of Senator Johnson's motion.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, just briefly, I agreed to sign the motion with Senator Johnson with the understanding the bill in its form now was cruddy and that it would be
