LB 102, 323

CLERK: 25 ayes, 6 nays on the adoption of Senator DeCamp's amendment, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried and the amendment is adopted. Are there any other amendments to the bill, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: No, sir, the bill is ready.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Labedz, you have explained the bill. What do you wish to do with it?

SENATOR LABEDZ: I move for the advancement of LB 102 from General File to E & R Initial.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Nichol, your light is on. Do you wish to speak? Okay. The motion is to advance the bill to E & R for review. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 1 nay on the motion to advance, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried and the bill is advanced. Next, LB 323, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Read title to LB 323. The bill was first read on January 16. It was referred to the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee. The bill was advanced to General File. There are no amendments pending, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. Speaker, as mean as this body is this morning and being a freshman Senator and all that, I am kind of afraid to stand up here.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Do you move the advancement of the bill?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Yes, I do. Three times in the last five years the Liquor Commission has come before this body to ask for a change in the statutes so that they can conform to the federal regulations. This has cost us \$15,000. All this bill does is give the liquor authority to conform to the federal regulations on the contents of spirits and wine bottles. There is no fiscal impact. It does not change anything. They are going to have to conform to the federal regulations anyway so this just saves them the trouble of running back here and asking us to introduce a bill.
