LB 133

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the Koch amendment to LB 133. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays on the adoption of Senator Koch's amendment, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried and the amendment is adopted. Now I think you have one more amendment on the desk.

CLERK: Read Dworak amendment found on page 696 of the Legislative Journal.

SENATOR DWORAK: What page is that amendment?

CLERK: 696 of the Journal, Senator. 96 and 97.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker, Senator Dworak is having some difficulty with that. I will accept that amendment. It just strikes "may be" and says "records which are necessary" which is fine.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, Senator Dworak....

SENATOR DWORAK: Mr. President, the intent of this amendment is to maintain some confidentiality. In other words, it ties this thing down a little bit, that these records should specifically say that they are necessary by the auditing officials of the state, State Education Authority. If these records are necessary, if they are the kind of records that are required, then they should be acceptable but just "may be" really loosens that thing up and it could just...anybody could take it or any kind of a record could be demanded so I urge the adoption of the amendment.

SENATOR KOCH: Question.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the Dworak amendment to LB 133. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on the motion to adopt, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried and the amendment is adopted. Now, Senator Koch.
