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don't know how many bills are on there. You know from experience it's going to be about a hundred and twenty left there, and you know you cannot treat these same number of bills in the short session plus those one hundred and twenty carried over. So, let us support Senator Beutler. I know that the limitation of six isn't even enough, but at least it's a start. I hope you support his amendment.

SENATOR NICHOL: Senator Newell.

SENATOR NEWELL: Mr. President and members of the body, I rise to support the Beutler amendment...rule change, and I'd like to do it in this context. We've heard a great deal today about we ought to let individuals introduce all the bills they want and restrict committees, we ought to put restrictions on committees, we ought to do this, we ought to do that, we ought to do something else. It's kind of an interesting issue. I think what you...when you look at the issue, not from a philosophical sense, because from a philosophical sense I agree with Senator Koch and Senator Wesely, that, you know, an individual comes down here and he ought to represent his constituency and if he's aggressive and if he's interested, and if he wants to deal with a lot of issues, and if he thinks he's going to be successful, then he ought to be able to do that. My contention is this...my contention is that Senator Wesely and Senator Koch are not wrong, but the problem is that we have to deal with the reality of the situation, and that reality is this, and it is simply this, that when you are asked as an individual to deal with legislation, many times you are asked, and many times you would like to have an opportunity to tell someone this bill is really not going to go anywhere, this bill really is not all that meritorious, but you, as a constituent, have a right for me to introduce this legislation. And basically, what I'm saying is sometimes legislators have an inability to say no. Now, let's look at this again. This six-bill limit in the second session is really no major restriction, and in reality, if you really need to introduce the bill, and you have already introduced your full six bills, you can find a committee to do that. And I don't know, I've looked at many other places, and I don't know how we can limit committee bills. I would ask Senator Warner one quick question. Senator Warner, how are we going to limit appropriations bills? Can you give me a solution to that problem?

SENATOR WARNER: Sure. How much time have I got?

SENATOR NEWELL: Well, very short. I...this is my speech.

SENATOR WARNER: I've got my whole speech here, I don't want to mess it up. That was my punch line I was going to lead to,
