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they say it will be. The amount of fluid which is used often will not be a preservative. The body is not going to be allowed to stay out of the ground long enough to decompose that much anyway so you are overcharged on embalming. You are overcharged on the box and you are made to feel that you are committing a crime against the departed one if you don't go for all of this high expenditure of money. So anything, anything, that will reduce this obscene hustling of money off the dead ought to be done, and as Job said, and I have to repeat it, Senator George, everytime an issue like this comes up, "Where the carcass is, there will the buzzards be gathered together." There would be people on this floor, I won't use the term "in this body" because of the nature of the discussion, people on this floor who will be swayed in their vote on issues related to laying away the dead by considerations of competition. Over here you have got a jackal who is a scavenger, I am not pointing to you, young lady, I am just gesturing, on one hand you have a jackal who is a scavenger. On the other hand you have the turkey buzzard and both of them have the same thing in mind, that is to consume the corpse, to consume the corpse. When a Legislature, whether it be state or national, will make it possible to build an industry on the remains of human beings and allow the people who are psychologically and emotionally distressed enough to be exploited in this mercenary fashion, I think that only can have occurred because those Legislatures, whether state or national, have not really given attention to what a demoralizing thing it is to deal with these merchants of death. I am not saying in a blanket fashion that every funeral director is a vulture, a turkey buzzard, or a jackal but I am saying that there have been enough documented cases of shabby services, overcharged, reused coffins and other things...

SENATOR LEWIS: One minute, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...to justify a serious look at this situation. So, Senator Wesely, while supporting your amendment and I will vote for the bill, I am also serving notice to the Legislature that next session I am going to come in with a bill and I expect the merchants of the dead to descend on you with a vengeance and don't be worried when they size you up as if they are trying to take your measurements because the tailor does the same thing when you walk into his or her shop but I am in favor of Senator Wesely's amendment because it will it appears save some money.

SENATOR LEWIS: We are on the Wesely amendment. Since
