

the call was registered with the City Air Quality Control Department. They went out and made the inspection, found that the industry was in violation and they gave them a variance, which in effect said go ahead you can continue to burn or continue to pollute, but we'll only let you do it for one week, or one month. And I think that's wrong, Senator. I think if they are in violation and we know that the health of the people living within that area is going to have its impact, then I think the industry should shut down immediately.

SENATOR GEORGE: Well, yes, that, Senator, would be mostly the rules and regulations as prescribed by the Department and the Council.

SENATOR VENDITTE: That is all, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Keyes, do you wish to speak to the...the motion is to advance the bill to E & R for Engrossment.

SENATOR KEYES: I'd like to comment on the statement that was made by my good friend Senator Venditte when he says if they are out of compliance we should shut them down. The city of Omaha's air pollution is not out of compliance with the federal government's standards, but if one individual enterprise is out, you don't shut it down, you've got to have some leeway and give it time to straighten out. I don't think that we want to shut industry down because I have a lot of packing houses up there that once in a while get out of line and I'd hate like the devil to slow this state down to that statement, Senator Venditte.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is to advance the bill to E & R for Engrossment. We take this vote...I'm sorry, haven't we advanced.....E & R for Initial. All those in favor vote aye. Opposed vote no. Have you all voted? The motion is to advance the bill. After we dispose of this matter, we'll take up one other bill and then we'll adjourn. The motion is to advance the bill. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record. Senator George.

SENATOR GEORGE: I have to call for a Call of the House.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the...first of all we have to go under Call, and then we can accept votes. The question is, shall the House go under Call? Record.
