Mr. President, your Enrolling Clerk respectfully reports that she has on this day at 9:50 a.m. presented to the Governor for his approval the following bills: 577, 441, 307, 269 and 36.

Mr. President, a communication from the Governor offering an appointment to the Motor Vehicle Licensing Board. That will be referred to the Committee on Committees.

Mr. President, your committee on Public Works whose Chairman is Senator Kremer to whom was referred LB 395 instructs me to report the same back to the Legislature with the recommendation it be advanced to General File; LB 546 to General File with amendments. Signed Senator Kremer, Chairman.
