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committee to allow that executive session to deal with some of the problems that Senator Simon has just brought up because I, too, find very large holes in this bill and some very large questions that I think need to be answered with the legislation that needs some amendments to them. I will go through those because I think those are of primary importance and I hope that you will consider these and allow the committee to deal with them in the executive session that we will be having. First off Senator Simon mentioned about restricting hospitals and their discretion in allowing or not allowing the use of Laetrile in their facilities. I think that is a fundamental issue. We are talking about freedom of choice. We don't allow, though, a freedom of choice for a hospital to use or not use Laetrile and I think that we ought to strike that section basically. Another question I have is how is Laetrile going to be supplied? Who is going to supply it and the quality, who is going to check the quality? I understand the Health Department will have some role in that but what are the processes by which Laetrile will be supplied? It is not legal interstate. It would only be legal within the state, intrastate, so the question then becomes where is it going to come from, who is going to market it, how is it going to be available, only by prescription? That is an important question. Another question, I would like to amend this bill and deal with some of the questions that Senator Simon again had. Our conventional therapy and conventional treatment, I would like to add a clause that basically says when all these amendments have been drafted, by the way, or will be drafted this afternoon before the executive session, and I have an amendment that would deal with the question of bypassing conventional therapy. I think that that is a major concern on my part where someone may believe that Laetrile is the answer to their cancer and that they go to that route and bypass chemotherapy or some other treatment which indeed, which in fact, could be successful, and by bypassing that conventional treatment have in fact created an even worse situation that may lead to their own death when in fact they could have been saved. And that is a serious problem and that is my most serious concern about this matter and I would want to have a section in that bill that says, yes, you can use Laetrile but only after you have considered or tried conventional treatment and found it to be ineffective or to have such terrible side effects and physical hurt and pain that you can no longer continue them. So then in that circumstance people ought to have a freedom of choice. They ought to be allowed to use Laetrile and if their decision is that that is what they want to use in their treatment then that is what they ought to be able to
