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decide for themselves. That is my personal philosophy but I also believe that the medical authorities which have spoke on this issue have raised good points, that there is successful treatment of cancer with conventional treatment and it shouldn't be bypassed in lieu of and instead gone to Laetrile. I think we shouldn't allow that.

PRESIDENT: One minute, Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Another question I have is what about a physician who doesn't comply with the provisions of this act? What is the penalty clause? I don't see any penalty clause. Are the records going to be kept of Laetrile use? What disciplinary actions are going to be available? It says that a physician cannot have disciplinary action taken against him for using Laetrile. What about malpractice? That is another question Senator Simon raised. What is going to happen when somebody does give somebody too much Laetrile or a wrong person Laetrile and they have adverse reactions? What is going to happen? The physician ought to be held responsible and that ought to be spelled out in the law. The last thing is false advertising. I have seen advertising for Laetrile that makes it out as a wonder drug, as a panacea for all cancer and I think that is misleading and it is false and we ought to deal with that in the bill and not allow it. So all these questions add up to this. The committee ought to be allowed to make some changes in the bill to make it workable. I ask you to oppose the motion to raise it out of committee, allow us to deal with some of these concerns and I think you will get a bill on the floor this year, I mean it is going to be a better bill, though, than that lies before you today. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Clark.

SENATOR CLARK: Mr. President, members, I take the opposite view of this particular Laetrile. They say that people have died from this, from using it. How many people have lived from using it? I think that that is the thing that has to be brought to the attention. Hospitals don't give medicine. All it says is they can't refuse it if the doctor decides to use it. Doctors give the medicine, not the hospitals. All it says in here is the physician can use it if he wants to. Now if you don't trust the physician, I suppose that is something else and I don't think any physician that had an operable cancer of some type that would not operate or counsel the people that that was what was going to save them and not Laetrile, then you are not trusting the physician. I think this is the big thing that really should be brought
