SENATOR NEWELL: Yes, I will help out and call for the question. I'd also like to have a roll call vote, if that is possible and a Call of the House. Might as well bring everybody in.

PRESIDENT: Alright, let's take the matter of the question first. I see five hands. All those in favor of ceasing debate, vote aye, opposed nay. Voting on ceasing debate on the DeCamp amendment to LB 234. Record the vote.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 4 nays, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The debate ceases, and do you want a Call of the House as soon as Senator DeCamp closes, or...Senator DeCamp do you wish to get them here first?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Whatever trips your trigger. Whatever you want.

PRESIDENT: Alright, let's...I'll accept the motion first then for a Call of the House. Senator Newell, I believe you added that. Motion is a Call of the House. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: 24 ayes, 0 nays to go under Call, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The House is under Call. The Sergeant at Arms will bring all members back into the Chamber. All members will return to their desks, and register their presence in the Chamber at this time, and after the...after Senator DeCamp has closed, we will have a roll call vote, at the request of Senator Newell. Have you all registered your presence? Senator Labeledz, you're here. Senator Haberman, are you present? Senator Keyes, are you with us, or against us? Okay. Ready then. Senator DeCamp, you may close.
