I strongly oppose the Kahle kill motion and I urge that you reject it.

SENATOR NICHOL: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, I have really enjoyed this discussion because other people are kind of at loggerheads and I think it is very good. One thing I am noticing is a rural-urban split and that is good, too, because as everybody has realized so far this session, we haven't gotten down to any of the real difficult issues that will divide the various members of the Legislature. So if the division can be clearly drawn on a nothing bill, then everybody knows where everybody else is residing. Senator Kahle, you said your son is in hog raising.
