SPEAKER MARVEL: The Clerk will call the roll.

CLERK: Roll call vote taken. (See pages 1135 and 1136, Legislative Journal.) 16 ayes, 28 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Motion lost. Senator Haberman, do you want to proceed for the next few moments with your amendment?

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President and fellow legislators, I don't mind taking the railroads for a few bucks. No, siree, let's take them if we can.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Yes, the Call is raised.

SENATOR HABERMAN: But this is a greedy bill. This takes from your friends and it takes from your neighbors. This bill says what is mine is mine and I want yours also. That is what the bill does. My district will lose \$86,000. We can't afford that. Due to the formula. So I say to you, fellow Senators, have some compassion, did you hear that, Senator Chambers, have some compassion in your heart for the western part of Nebraska and don't take away from us. All my amendment does is says that no governmental subdivision shall receive less revenue. Give me what we have now. You take the rest of it and this increase will give you more money in your districts. So I ask you to support my amendment, to be fair about it and not take advantage of your neighbors. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Mr. Clerk, do you want to read the amendment?

CLERK: Mr. President, the amendment reads as follows: Read Haberman amendment offered on page 1136, Legislative Journal.
