I think there are places available that are close by where the people live. They don't have to travel long distances. There are other people that will help them. There are independents, republicans, democrats that are glad to help people go vote and I don't think this is a necessary piece of legislation. I hope we support the kill motion.

SPEAKER MARVEL: We have two minutes left on the bill. Senator Johnson, do you wish to speak on indefinite postponement?

SENATOR JOHNSON: Yes, I do, Mr. Speaker. I think that, members of this body, it would be wrong to indefinitely postpone this bill. Yesterday we talked about allowing deputy sheriffs to participate in the political process and the kind of discussion we had centered again and again and again on the importance of being active in the democratic process. Again one of the most important aspects of we, free people in a democratic society is our ability to vote. We need every encouragement to exercise that right and for us to be allowed to register at a polling place on election day so that we might participate in the next election continues to reinforce our right to vote and it continues to reaffirm our essence as a free person in a democratic society exercising our will as we best know how. I have worked polling places. I spent five years in Omaha as an inspector of a polling place and I know that polling places are not nearly as busy as they ought to be. There was adequate time for poll workers to be able to handle voter registration on election day. To think that the registrars will not be able to conduct the election and to register voters is basically incorrect. There is time available. People can do this function and it continues to be a reaffirmation of our belief in the democratic traditions and our assertion of losses of free people able to vote. I would urge you to vote against the kill motion.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Fifteen minutes has elapsed and this is the procedure. We have a motion to indefinitely postpone. That and the bill will move to the bottom of this particular file and I've got the order in which you asked to appear and we will protect that so the next time this comes up you can proceed from there. The Clerk will read what ever business he has into the record and then we will recess until 1:30.
