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before the committee, the recommendations of the Appropriations Committee were no way going to affect the operation of the office but I think it is interesting that if you go through the bill time after time after time that we do change the name of the Office of Planning and Programming to the Policy Research Office and so maybe, and I'd have to agree, Senator Duis is not one to mislead the people, but I have to emphasize that insofar as the people are concerned, the people are going to believe that the Office of Planning and Programming has been discontinued when in effect all we have done is put a different coat on it and it is galloping along as healthy as ever. In fact, it is galloping along with an infusion of new money and a cloak, a white cloak, over it which is going to perhaps make it look a little different when, in fact, it isn't. But I think the most important thing of the whole issue is this, that when we brought up sunset, we said we were going to have some impact upon government. We were going to review these agencies but we have found an agency here which Senator Warner says is performing some responsibilities. I suggest that those responsibilities were being performed by other agencies before that office was created. He said they are going to be transferred to other agencies. The review of the testimony before both committees indicates that there is overlapping responsibility over the past six or eight years. It is a tendency of government to grow. Mr. Nelson, the former Director, and perhaps he said it facetiously but I want to repeat again, said it is a tendency of all government agencies to grow. The secret is to grow only so fast that you don't become noticeable, because once you become noticeable, someone wants to stamp you out. I suggest that the Office of Planning and Programming has found a method by which it can grow, a method by which it can further enhance itself with the Legislature, other government agencies, and that it will continue to grow as will all other government agencies because the plain facts are this Legislature nor no other government body can resist the lobbying impact of the agencies themselves. They are tremendous. They spread clear across the state. They spread into my legislative district. I have heard repeatedly from people in my district who lament the fact that I oppose the continuation of the office. The facts are that those people who complain to me are the ones who are involved with the State Office of Planning and Programming.

SPEAKER MARVEL: One minute.

SENATOR SCHMIT: They are not the people who are out there
